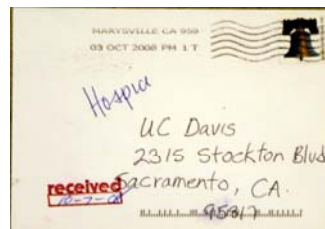
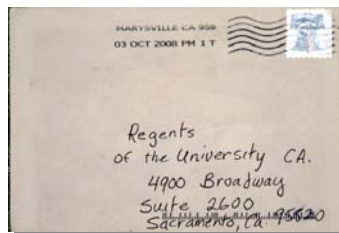

Suspect: Possible Male Adult using the name of "J. Meyers"

Incident(s): UC Davis Medical Center has received five suspicious letters at multiple locations. These letters contain cards with cut newspaper advertisements for gun sales. The written content in the cards make reference to "Satan" and make inferred threats to staff. (See Back Side for Identifying Suspicious letters)

What to look for in a suspicious Letters:

- Inappropriate or unusual labeling
- Excessive postage
- Handwritten or poorly typed addresses
- Misspellings of common words
- Strange return address or no return address
- Incorrect titles or title without a name
- Not addressed to a specific person
- Marked with restrictions, such as “Personal”, “Confidential”, or “Do not x-ray”
- Marked with any threatening language
- Postmarked from a city or state that does not match the return address

Possible Appearance of a suspicious letter:

- Powdery substance felt through or appearing on the package or envelope
- Oily stains, discolorations, or odor
- Lopsided or uneven envelope

Handling of Suspicious Unopened Envelopes

At any time an envelope is received that appears suspicious, these instructions should be followed:

- Do not shake or empty the contents of any suspicious envelope.
- Do not carry the envelope, show it to others or allow others to examine it.
- Put the envelope down on a stable surface; do not sniff, touch, taste, or look closely at it or at any contents which may have spilled.
- Alert others in the area about the suspicious envelope. Leave the area, close any doors, and take actions to prevent others from entering the area. If possible, shut off the ventilation system.
- If at work, notify a supervisor and/ or a law enforcement official.
- WASH hands with soap and water to prevent spreading potentially infectious material to face or skin.

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
